# Purpose of Report

1. To inform Members of the latest developments with regards to Merseyside Fire and Rescue Authority's involvement with Merseyside Brussels Office (MBO).

# Recommendation

2. That Members note the content of this report.

# Introduction & Background

- 3. At the Authority meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2012 Members received an update on the work of the Merseyside Brussels Office by the MBO lead officer James Sharples. At that meeting Members requested more regular updates on the ways in which the Fire and Rescue Authority engages with the MBO.
- 4. Merseyside Brussels Office holds quarterly meetings with member organisations to discuss the latest developments in Brussels and the actual and potential impact on Merseyside and the Liverpool City Region (including Halton). The last such meeting was held on 11<sup>th</sup> March and the previous meeting was on 5<sup>th</sup> December 2012. The MBO Policy Focus Update document for the March meeting is attached as an appendix for information.

- 5. Matters such as the EU budget from 2014 and the future of the EU Cohesion Policy were discussed, with information provided about the types of funding that may be available to Merseyside from next year, as well as some of the funds still remaining in the current EU budget.
- 6. A large part of the December meeting was given over to a presentation by the officer for the North West Health Brussels Office, which was of particular interest to the attendees from MFRA. It is apparent that much of the research work relating to health matters, particularly the social dimension to health, is relevant to MFRA and that making closer contacts in this area may be an appropriate way of tapping into EU funding as part of a larger project. One particular example is the programme of work taking place on Merseyside that is looking at assisted living and dementia. MFRA is already closely involved in dementia related projects so this would fit with existing priorities.
- 7. At the meeting, contact was made with a consultant on European Policy and Strategy who is working with Liverpool Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) on the coordination of a number of national and transnational projects related to dementia. It is considered that working with this consultant could connect MFRA with other agencies working in this area and potentially to European funding through involvement with the LEP group. Membership of the group includes all three universities in Liverpool and MFRA has been invited to send a representative to the next meeting of the LEP group. As such, the Prevention and Protection Function is now taking this forward.
- 8. One focus of the March meeting was the extent to which EU funding would be available to the North West and the Liverpool City Region in particular, from 2014. The representative from the LEP explained the way in which the LEP is working with stakeholders to develop priorities for the area that it can present to the EU and UK Government. Work is ongoing to examine how best MFRA can be involved in this process.
- 9. Teams within Prevention and Protection are also meeting with the MBO representative to examine any programmes within the current EU budget that still have funds remaining that MFRA could bid for. Any outcomes from this will be reported to a future meeting.

# Equality & Diversity Implications

10. Working closely with as wide a range of partners as possible to deal with the impact of dementia is an important part of meeting the growing needs of the elderly on Merseyside.
